



# NINO Publication Subsidy

version May 2021

## Goals

NINO Publication Subsidies are a temporary funding instrument, meant as a stimulus to complete publication projects already in progress, and to publish in Open Access. The publication should be available in print or digitally within 24 months following the award of a Publication Subsidy.

## Eligibility

The main author (applicant) should be a scholar affiliated with a university or institute in the Netherlands, an independent scholar residing in the Netherlands, a graduate student enrolled at a university in the Netherlands or a graduate student of Dutch nationality enrolled at a university abroad. Preference will be given to publications clearly linked to research projects or collections in the Netherlands.

The manuscript or proposal must have been accepted for publication by a publisher or by the editors of a series or journal, and a projected publication date should be cited.

The publication can be a scholarly monograph or an edited volume. The subject of the publication should fall within NINO's scope of interest: studies of the Ancient Near East (incl. Egypt) and closely related fields, including interdisciplinary studies.

Publication Subsidies cannot be used retroactively, i.e. for costs that have already been paid before the award date, or for publications that have already appeared.

The maximum amount of an application is € 5000. Preference may be given to applications for lower amounts, so that more applications may be awarded. Matching funds are an asset to the application.

Eligible costs include, but are not limited to:

- translation costs
- Open Access fees (only for a scholarly monograph or an edited volume)
- copyright fees for the use of relevant images
- costs for creating and editing photographs or illustrations
- student assistant's salary for preparing a manuscript

Non-eligible costs include research-related costs, such as:

- acquisition of data
- library and publication subscription fees
- salary compensation for the author's employment (i.e., a paid sabbatical to write a manuscript).



## Application

Applications are to be submitted through the submission form on the NINO website.

The application should detail

- a short abstract of the publication, describing its contents and outlining its relevance;
- the table of contents (for articles: list of subheadings);
- specifics of the publication (e.g., name of the publisher, volume number in a series, ISBN, journal title and issue number);
- a budget table, including information on other funds received or applied for;
- a short motivation of the application.

The deadline for applications is 15 August 2021.

## Please note

NINO Publication Subsidies are awarded on the condition that NINO is credited in the printed and/or digital publication. This may take the form of an acknowledgement e.g. in a colophon or footnote, and/or the use of the NINO logo – to be agreed upon between the author, the publisher, and NINO.

NINO does not provide mediation between authors and publishers.

Manuscripts accepted for publication in one of NINO's publication series or journals are eligible for a Publication Subsidy; however, acceptance of a manuscript and award of a Publication Subsidy are judged separately.

By submitting your application to NINO

- you vouch for the veracity of the information you provide;
- you agree to NINO's conditions for application, and NINO's regulations for Publication Subsidies;
- you agree that, if successful, your publication's title and details (but not its full text) may be included in communications by NINO.
